## This year saw the 21st Anniversary of Bolnore Village

In 2001 JFA Landscape Ecology, together with The Conservation Volunteers, carried out their final wildlife survey of Phase 1. The invertebrates and reptiles (newts, common lizards, grass snakes) found within the area of Phase 1 were collected and relocated prior to commencement of construction work.

Wildlife Sighting Reports taken by FoABW since then have shown we still have healthy populations of newts, common lizards and grass snakes.

Comparing a recent bird survey by FoABW with a survey carried out by JFA in 2001, it would seem that the numbers of birds visiting and residing in and around the woodland is still as diverse.

## 2001 JFA Final Bird Survey – Phase 1

Blackcap, Bullfinch, Carrion Crow, Chaffinch, Chiffchaff, Common Buzzard, Coat Tit, Long Tailed Tit, Marsh Tit, Willow Tit, Garden Warbler, Grasshopper Warbler, Willow Warbler, Goldcrest, Goshawk, Goldfinch, Greenfinch, Green Woodpecker, Hobby, Honey Buzzard, House Sparrows, Jackdaw, Jay, Kestrel, Linnets, Magpie, Mallard, Merlin, Moorhen, Pheasant, Snipe, Sparrowhawk, Tawny Owl, Whitethroat and Woodcock.

With the exception of the *Linnets, Snipe, Woodcock and Honey Buzzard*, all of the above can still be seen or heard in Ashenground Wood today.

## Conservation Activities Report

Our conservation activities are guided by the FOABW Conservation Management Plan. The aim of the Plan is to:

- ‡ [Improve biodiversity](#) by creating a more varied age structure among standard trees in the woodland by means of coppicing and restoring the meadows through a mowing regime.
- ‡ [Encourage appropriate recreational use of the woods and meadows](#) by creating open places, paths with wide scallops and seats.
- ‡ [Maintain paths](#) to counter erosion and path-widening, and to discourage the creation of ad hoc paths.

Over the last twelve months, we made good progress delivering the Plan. We had 12 weekend sessions (1 per month) and put in around 30 hours work as a group. We averaged just under 7 volunteers per session (between 4 and 11) equating to around 210 person hours.

- ‡ In March/April 2022, we finished coppicing hazel near the tool container and chestnut coppicing in Catts Wood.
- ‡ In May/June 2022, we woodchipped the entire path through Pond Meadow.
- ‡ In July 2022, we cut back brambles overhanging the paths around Pond Meadow.
- ‡ Between August and December 2022, we mowed Pond Meadow, Weavers Meadow and the buffer zones around Renfields, Trubwick Avenue and Quarry Hollow.
- ‡ So far this year, we have focussed on cutting back some of the holly in Ashenground Wood.

We also did litter picking and removed on average 1-2 bags of rubbish per session. Last year we noted unusually high levels of litter in the buffer zone off Trubwick Avenue.

Highlights for the last twelve months include a noticeable increase in the number of orchids seen in Pond Meadow last summer and receiving a special **Haywards Heath in Bloom award** from Councillor Sandy Ellis.

Looking ahead, we have submitted an entry for this year's South and South East in Bloom competition under the category, 'It's your neighbourhood'. This category looks at local community participation, environmental responsibility and conservation achievement. Judging will be between 12 June and 14 July 2023.
